Many Jewish people will eat special potato pancakes called latkes, sing songs, and spin a top called a dreidel to win chocolate coins, nuts, or raisins.

Kwanzaa, which means "First Fruits," is based on ancient African harvest festivals. It celebrates ideals such as family, life, and unity. During this spiritual holiday, celebrated from December 26 to January 1, millions of African Americans dress in special clothes. They also decorate their homes with fruits and vegetables, and light a candle holder called a kinara.

Imagine it... It's Christmas Eve, tonight a large, bearded old man will break into the houses of millions of innocent children. It sounds like the most terrifying thing in the world! So it makes you wonder how someone like Santa could become such a Holiday Icon.

Believe it or not, St. Nick was a real person! Nicholas of Bari was a Greek Bishop who was born on March 15th, 270 in modern day Turkey. We don't know much about him, aside from the tales that would immortalize him as the "Real Life Santa."

The most famous of these stories is the origin of hanging stockings! The tale says three women were unable to pay their dowry (a payment of money to the groom), when St. Nicholas heard their plight, he dropped coins down their drying stockings when they weren't looking. Meaning they were able to pay for their wedding!

The Germans and Dutch were especially fond of their St. Nicholas stories who brought them to America under the name of 'Sinterklaas' whose name was warped into... Santa Claus! Santa's elves and reindeer were first mentioned in the classic 1823 poem "T'was the Night before Christmas" where he himself is said to be an elf!

Ol' Claus's last transformation came from of all places... Coca-Cola! Santa didn't have his bright red suit (he still wore deep and dark red shades before) until Coca-Cola gave him one to go along with their classic Red and White color scheme during the 1930's.

A shoe maker needs to make a large amount of shoes but doesn't have the time and so many elves came to help him make the shoes it's like the story was made in December and there for the public started to combine the two together.

Holiday Traditions - Jophia DelaRosa

A Holiday tradition in Guatemala is La Quema del Diablo - At 6:00pm sharp on the 7th of December, the country of Guatemala is lit up with fire as hundreds of thousands of man-made devils burn in the streets. They believe that with Satan in ashes, they have a new start.

One of Romania's most treasured holiday traditions is caroling - Around noon, groups of children go door to door caroling. Decades ago, the children were accompanied by a real bear but now is just a lucky person in a bear costume.

A holiday tale in Iceland is the tale of the yule cat. He's a cat you definitely don't want showing up at your house. His name is Jólakötturinn, he's larger than you house, and his mission is to eat any kid who didn't receive clothes before Christmas. If you do good with your chores, you receive clothes.

One of Ireland's holiday traditions is called "Women's Christmas" - On Jan 6th, the men stay home and do women's work (dishes, cooking, etc) while the women go out (usually with other women) and do as they please.

One of Norway's holiday traditions is hiding brooms -They hide brooms because their superstitions say witches and evil spirits come out at night to wreak havoc, but if they don't have any brooms to ride on, their fun is put to a end.

Japan's holiday tradition is eating KFC - In 1974 Japan launched a campaign called "Kentucky for Christmas". Japan hasn't looked back since.

A favorite Ukrainian holiday tradition involves spider webs - The tradition is based on the legend of a poor widow who couldn't afford to decorate their Christmas tree. Her children were upset because of this, but when they woke in the morning, they found their tree decorated in shing, silver spider webs. To this day, spiders are considered good luck in Ukraine.

Holiday Traditions Continued - Sophia DelaRosa

Italy enjoys celebrating Panevin and La Befana - In Italy not all witches are bad. La Befana is a good witch who goes to the homes of good children baring gifts. Panevin is a ritual of abundance. People crowd around a massive bonfire. At this bonfire a puppet representing all the wrongdoings of the previous years burns in the bonfire. If the bonfire's smoke goes south or east, the crops will be plentiful, but if the smoke blows north or west, the harvest will be poor.

Mexico merchants & artisans love participating in La Noche de Rábanos (The Night of the Radishes) - The Night of the Radishes is a festival where merchants & artisans sell sculptures made of radishes. These sculptures are mostly used for Christmas center pieces!

Catalonia's tradition is called Tió de Nadal - Tió de Nadal roughly translates to "Christmas log". A hollowed log is given a red hat, a blanket to stay warm, a face, and legs. Starting on 12-8 families start "feeding" the logs by shoving presents into the hollow part. Finally on 12-24, the family hits the log with a stick demanding it to spit out the presents while singing traditional holiday songs.


Australia celebrates Christmas in the summer. Since Australia is in the Southern hemisphere, it's a 90 degree summer when Christmas rolls around. Naturally, Australians head to the beach to cool off. If you are lucky you just might see a surfing santa!

While Australians are surfing and have parties, Venezuelans are skating to mass. On Christmas Day, cars are banned from many locations in the city until 8am. On Christmas Eve children tie one end of a string to their big toe and hang the other end of the string out their window so people skating by can give a friendly tug on their way to the mass that morning.

Wales likes to participate in something called dead horse caroling - In December or January in Wales, you might open your door only to find someone hidden by a bell-adorned sheet and ribbon, holding up a real horse skull on a stick. They are usually followed by a few revelers. Following tradition, this group will sing to you then challenge you to a battle of rhyming insults in Welsh. After the battle, the carolling group is often invited into the host's home for refreshments.

Japan -KFC





Christmas.




Holiday-Themed Music -Anna Pollock
